Harvest of Memories: Celebrating 200 Years of St George's Church.

Dear fellow members of Christ's family

On the 12th of October, we will celebrate and commemorate the 200 years of our wonderful church building here at St George's. Our bicentennial service will be attended by our diocesan bishop, Rt Revd Philip North, who will preside at the 9:30am Eucharist and rededicate our restored reredos panels behind the high altar. I hope to see as many of you celebrate this auspicious occasion with us; two hundred years of faith, fellowship, and service at the heart of our community.

October is of course a season of abundance and of thanksgiving. We celebrated our Harvest Thanksgiving service in September, but it is good to remind ourselves that there is something profoundly spiritual about autumn too. The fields are heavy with the bounty of the year's labour; and as the days grow shorter and the evenings draw in, we are invited to pause and reflect on the gifts we have received—both seen and unseen. It is a time to remember that all we have comes from God, and to offer thanks by sharing our abundance with our neighbours.

How fitting, then, that this October we also gather to give thanks for a different kind of harvest: the lives touched, the prayers whispered, the friendships forged, and the legacy built over two centuries within the walls of St George's Church. It is almost impossible to imagine the world as it was when the doors of St George's first creaked open in 1825. The parish was smaller and the world beyond our fields (as there was then) was much further away. Yet, amid all the changes wrought by time—the industrial revolution, world wars, social upheavals, and moments of national joy and sorrow—this church has stood as a beacon of hope and a gathering place for all.

The bicentennial is not simply a commemoration of our building's age. It is a celebration of the faith that built it, the people who filled its pews, and the generations who have carried its mission into the world. For

two hundred years, St George's has been a sanctuary through storms and sunlit days, a place where new life is welcomed, vows are spoken, and sad farewells are gently given. The spirited hymns that have echoed through the stone walls, and the quiet prayers offered, all are woven into the fabric of our church's story.

We honour not just the clergy who have led with wisdom and grace, but also the lay people—the flower arrangers, bell ringers, vestry members, and countless volunteers—who have kept the flame of service burning bright.

As we reflect on the legacy handed down to us, and as we plan and hope for the future, let us put our trust in a: "God who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20).

Our Vision - Closer to Christ; further out for Christ.

As we mark this season of change and this bicentennial of faith, let us pray:

God of all seasons,
We thank you for the harvest of memories, love, and service
that fills our lives through the ministry of St George's Church.
Grant us wisdom to honour the past,
courage to embrace the present,
and hope to plant seeds for the future.
As leaves turn and the world prepares for rest,
renew our spirits and strengthen our bonds,
that we may continue to shine as a beacon of your love
for generations to come.

Spotlight on Safeguarding

Every year our Parish Safeguarding Policy is renewed –
this is an important document that sets out why
safeguarding is important and how our
Parish wil ensure that we keep everyone
safe. In accordance with the Church of

England Safeguarding Policy our Church is committed to:

Promoting a safer environment and culture.

- Safely recruiting and supporting all those with any responsibility related to children, young people and vulnerable adults within the Church.
- Responding promptly to every safeguarding concern or allegation.
- Caring pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse and other affected persons.
- Caring pastorally for those who are the subject of concerns or allegations of abuse and other affected persons.
- Responding to those that may pose a present risk to others.

The Parish will:

- Create a safe and caring place for all.
- Have a named Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) to work with the incumbent and the PCC to implement policy and procedures.
- Safely recruit, train and support all those with any responsibility for children, young people and adults to have the confidence and skills to recognise and respond to abuse.

- Ensure that there is appropriate insurance cover for all activities involving children and adults undertaken in the name of the parish.
- Display in Church premises and on the Parish website the details of who to contact if there are safeguarding concerns or support needs.
- Listen to and take seriously all those who disclose abuse.
- Take steps to protect children and adults when a safeguarding concern of any kind arises, following House of Bishops guidance, including notifying the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser (DSA) and statutory agencies immediately.
- Offer support to victims/survivors of abuse regardless of the type of abuse, when or where it occurred.
- Care for and monitor any member of the church community who
 may pose a risk to children and adults whilst maintaining
 appropriate confidentiality and the safety of all parties.
- Ensure that health and safety policy, procedures and risk assessments are in place and that these are reviewed annually.
- Review the implementation of the Safeguarding Policy, Procedures and Practices at least annually.

Each person who works within this Church community will agree to abide by this policy and the guidelines established by this church.

International Aid Shoebox Appeal 2025

I would like to start by thanking ,once again, everyone who took part in last year's shoebox appeal. 100 boxes was quite something!

This year we are running the Appeal from 28th September to 2nd November.

The shoebox appeal brings joy and hope each year to many thousands of people of all ages. These gifts have brought smiles to children and adults living in poverty in Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia, Latin America and even the UK.

When you send a shoebox you are sending more than just a box filled with useful and fun items; it's a personal gift just for the person receiving it, a message of hope and love, reflecting the love of Jesus.

It's also personal for those of us filling a shoebox; choosing who the box is for, selecting appropriate items to send, wrapping the box, maybe writing a greetings card, all help us to care about the person who will receive the gift.

Letting people in desperate circumstances know that someone cares and they are not forgotten is so important. That's why shoeboxes are sent to people of all ages from babies to elderly people, and why they are delivered throughout the year, not just at Christmas. These gifts are distributed by International Aid's own teams and local churches who know their communities well and reach out with Christ's love to those in need.

Last Christmas, the church at Motovylivka, in Ukraine, shared the good news of Jesus' birth through drama, songs and fun. These services were attended by hundreds of children and young people who all received a shoebox. I include a message from Pastor Andrei, "We are very grateful for you sending these wonderful gifts. We give the shoeboxes to children who might not have anything else, kids whose parents are in the military, kids whose parents might have died. May

the Lord bless you and return it to you one hundred fold"

At the beginning of this year a team from IAT went out to Sierra Leone, to coincide with the arrival of a container from the Lancashire warehouse, loaded with aid and shoeboxes. One of the sites they were distributed at was the New Hope Church where they held a special Shoebox Sunday. Over 200 boxes were given out at this one church and they were received with much joy and amazement, many of the children playing with the toys straight away. One little girl, Haja, was keen to share her enjoyment of everything in her shoebox and to say "thank you very much".

There are two ways you can send a shoebox, the traditional way of filling a box, wrapping and labelling it and bringing it to church or send a virtual shoebox. The virtual shoebox scheme enables you to make a donation for a box to be filled full of useful and fun items. You can choose the area of the world and age and gender of the person you would like the gift to go to. Gifts are packed and distributed by local teams, which, in turn, helps to support local economies. Should you wish to donate by this method visit www.internationalaidtrust.org.uk/shoeboxes/virtual

Details of what to put in the shoeboxes and how to wrap them are on the photo below. Leaflets are also available in church. Please donate what you are able, maybe join forces with other family members to fill a box and return to church by Sunday 2nd November.

St. George's Church - Bicentenary Celebration Year

This year, 2025, is the bicentenary of St. George's Church. One special activity, among various other events and activities to celebrate the bicentenary, is to create a time capsule.

The primary purpose of a time capsule is to preserve objects and information from a specific point in time for future discovery and reflection. It serves as a snapshot of the present, intended to be opened and examined by people in the future, often with the aim of providing insights into our life experiences from the past.

It is intended that the time capsule will be completed in time for our Celebration Service in October.

One consideration has been regarding how long a time span before the capsule should be opened. The longer it is sealed, the more difficult it can be to choose items to be included. A span of 100 years is often a popular choice, however, previous experience has proved choosing a shorter time such as 50 years allows some of the original participants to experience the opening, and for the items included to bring back memories. As such, it is planned for the capsule to be opened in the year 2075.

It is planned to collect a number of appropriate items to include within the time capsule that will provide a view of what life was like in 2025, with an emphasis on our local community, parish life and St George's Church.

If you wish to include any items, please discuss with me. It is hoped as many appropriate items offered will be included, but space will be limited, and items will need to be suitable to avoid deterioration or damage over the next 50 years.


A second book of possibly three is in the pipeline which she hopes the publishers will accept shortly.

The History Page October 2025 Two Hundred Years Ago

The First Public Service at St George's Chapel of Ease, 9th October 1825

This month will see a special commemoration of the first Sunday service at St George's Church. The service would use the 1824 Service Book which is still held in our archive. Proceedings would likely centre around Morning Prayer, with Collect, Epistle and Gospel for the nineteenth Sunday after Trinity. This would be followed by a sermon, possibly of great length. There may have been a celebration of the Eucharist, although such were held sparingly at the time.

At some stage The Old Hundreth Psalm would be said or sung unaccompanied. There was no organ at St George's until 1837 and no mention of an "orchestra"- a polite way of referring to the two or three players who appeared at church or tavern in those days.

The service was conducted by Robert Mosley Master, then doing duty at the mother church St Laurence's, in the absence of his uncle John Whalley Master, the rector. Robert was shortly to become curate in charge of Burnley where he was dubbed "The Clogging Parson" due to

his determination to equip poorer children with footwear. He later became Archdeacon of Manchester and rector in his family's living at Croston.

It seems all denominations took to Robert during his short stay in Chorley. As he left the town, there was a gathering of grateful folk and a presentation at Astley Hall to wish him well.
