Dear Friends,

One of the most precious gifts God gives His people is the gift of rest. From the very beginning, in the story of creation, we see that rest is woven into the rhythm of life – a time to pause, to take a breath, and to delight in what God has made. In our busy world, it can be easy to think that rest is a luxury or even a waste of time, but Scripture shows us it is neither. Rest is not about doing nothing; it is about making space to be renewed, to listen, and to allow God to restore our hearts. Jesus Himself often withdrew from the crowds to spend time in prayer with His Father. If He, in the midst of a ministry full of urgency, made time for rest, how much more do we need it?

In recent weeks, we have been blessed with moments of joy and fellowship in our parish. Our Starship Adventure holiday club brought together children, churches, families, and volunteers for a few days of creativity, laughter, and meaningful exploration of their faith. Nearly 80 children and young people took part in this holiday club and had the opportunity to go deeper in their faith and grow their relationships with our parish. I am so grateful to everyone who gave their time and talents to make it happen, and to those who prayed for the children who came along.

A little earlier in the month, the Mothers' Union gathered from around Blackburn archdeaconry at St George's Church for the Mary Sumner Day service – a beautiful occasion of worship, thanksgiving, and encouragement, reminding us of the lasting impact that one person's faithful obedience can have on generations to come.

These events, though very different in character, share something important: they each flow out of hearts renewed in God's presence. When we are rested in Him – when we take the time to step back, breathe, and be with Him – we are better able to serve others with joy. Without this rhythm of rest and work, we risk running dry and losing the sense of purpose and delight in what we do.

I write this letter in the middle of August but you won't receive it until September, but as we work in the midst of an interregnum, it is important we remember that all our parish does is God's work. The work is not dependant on how much effort we put in, but on him. As such I pray that you have had a summer in which you have made time to pause and reflect and been able to spend time with God. I pray too that, as we approach the busy season ahead, you continue make time and space to rest in God's presence.

Spotlight on Safeguarding

This month I would like to focus on an important issue of suicide.

In times of crisis, help is available.

If you need urgent help as you are in mental health distress, then there is always someone you can call.

If you are experiencing a mental health crisis or something that makes you feel severely unsafe, distressed, or worried about your mental health, you can now contact your local crisis service by calling NHS 111 and selecting the mental health option.

Our Mental Health Crisis Line is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by calling 0800 953 0110. It is staffed by trained mental health professionals who are able to provide assessment and referrals to appropriate services. Ring it if you need to access services or for advice about someone who needs treatment or support.

You may have experienced a life changing event or you might not know why you feel this way.

Sometimes people feel so low that life seems unbearable. Others feel they can't cope with what they are going through and just want the pain to end.

If you feel like this, help is available and you can get through this. You deserve help and with time you'll find that life is worth living. Telling someone how you're feeling is the first step to getting help, staying safe and getting through this.

Taiking about your feelings may feel scary or embarrassing but please don't suffer in silence. You do not have to struggle with difficult feelings alone. Tell a friend, family member, work colleague, GP or anyone else you can trust.

Some people find speaking to a stranger easier. Whatever you're going through, a Samaritan will face it with you 24/7, just call 116 123.

If you are experiencing a mental health crisis but are not in immediate danger, call NHS 111.

International Aid Shoebox Appeal 2025

I would like to start by thanking ,once again, everyone who took part in last year's shoebox appeal. 100 boxes was quite something!

This year we are running the Appeal from 28th September to 2nd November.

The shoebox appeal brings joy and hope each year to many thousands of people of all ages. These gifts have brought smiles to children and adults living in poverty in Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia, Latin America and even the UK.

When you send a shoebox you are sending more than just a box filled with useful and fun items; it's a personal gift just for the person receiving it, a message of hope and love, reflecting the love of Jesus.

It's also personal for those of us filling a shoebox; choosing who the box is for, selecting appropriate items to send, wrapping the box, maybe writing a greetings card, all help us to care about the person who will receive the gift.

Letting people in desperate circumstances know that someone cares and they are not forgotten is so important. That's why shoeboxes are sent to people of all ages from babies to elderly people, and why they are delivered throughout the year, not just at Christmas. These gifts are distributed by International Aid's own teams and local churches who know their communities well and reach out with Christ's love to those in need.

Last Christmas, the church at Motovylivka, in Ukraine, shared the good news of Jesus' birth through drama, songs and fun. These services were attended by hundreds of children and young people who all received a shoebox. I include a message from Pastor Andrei, "We are very grateful for you sending these wonderful gifts. We give the shoeboxes to children who might not have anything else, kids whose parents are in the military, kids whose parents might have died. May

the Lord bless you and return it to you one hundred fold"

At the beginning of this year a team from IAT went out to Sierra Leone, to coincide with the arrival of a container from the Lancashire warehouse, loaded with aid and shoeboxes. One of the sites they were distributed at was the New Hope Church where they held a special Shoebox Sunday. Over 200 boxes were given out at this one church and they were received with much joy and amazement, many of the children playing with the toys straight away. One little girl, Haja, was keen to share her enjoyment of everything in her shoebox and to say "thank you very much".

There are two ways you can send a shoebox, the traditional way of filling a box, wrapping and labelling it and bringing it to church or send a virtual shoebox. The virtual shoebox scheme enables you to make a donation for a box to be filled full of useful and fun items. You can choose the area of the world and age and gender of the person you would like the gift to go to. Gifts are packed and distributed by local teams, which, in turn, helps to support local economies. Should you wish to donate by this method visit www.internationalaidtrust.org.uk/shoeboxes/virtual

Details of what to put in the shoeboxes and how to wrap them are on the photo below. Leaflets are also available in church. Please donate what you are able, maybe join forces with other family members to fill a box and return to church by Sunday 2nd November.

St. George's Church - Bicentenary Celebration Year

This year, 2025, is the bicentenary of St. George's Church. One special activity, among various other events and activities to celebrate the bicentenary, is to create a time capsule.

The primary purpose of a time capsule is to preserve objects and information from a specific point in time for future discovery and reflection. It serves as a snapshot of the present, intended to be opened and examined by people in the future, often with the aim of providing insights into our life experiences from the past.

It is intended that the time capsule will be completed in time for our Celebration Service in October.

One consideration has been regarding how long a time span before the capsule should be opened. The longer it is sealed, the more difficult it can be to choose items to be included. A span of 100 years is often a popular choice, however, previous experience has proved choosing a shorter time such as 50 years allows some of the original participants to experience the opening, and for the items included to bring back memories. As such, it is planned for the capsule to be opened in the year 2075.

It is planned to collect a number of appropriate items to include within the time capsule that will provide a view of what life was like in 2025, with an emphasis on our local community, parish life and St George's Church.

If you wish to include any items, please discuss with me. It is hoped as many appropriate items offered will be included, but space will be limited, and items will need to be suitable to avoid deterioration or damage over the next 50 years.

Parish Share

Parish Share in the Church of England is a financial contribution that each parish makes to its diocese to fund local ministry and mission. It may seem a large sum, but it is important to remember that most of the money we contribute comes back to us in one form or another: as ministry, services and support. Every parish gives, and every parish receives. The largest portion of Parish Share, around 70%, is allocated to parish ministry. This includes placing priests in every benefice. It also covers stipends, pensions, clergy housing and training for current and future clergy.

In our Parish we have always considered full payment of our Parish Share as essential and a key financial priority. We have always been fortunate to be able to fund this through giving, fundraising and various legacies we have received over the years, underpinned by strong financial planning and management. However, this has become much more challenging in recent years.

In order to better explain how Parish Share works, a new animated video has been produced by the diocese, the video transcript is also included.

The History Page September 1825 Two Hundred Years Ago

The consecration of St George's chapel of ease having taken place on 11th August, one might expect services to continue almost immediately. This was not so.

The August date had been picked by Bishop Blomfield of Chester to suit his planned itinerary around Lancashire and was only notified to the mother church in the month prior. There was still much to be done, not least the letting of a quarter of the pews in order to raise a stipend for the curate doing duty. On paper the amount committed was very handsome for a Commissioners' church, although reality never quite matched this. As for architect Thomas Rickman, he still needed to make a final inspection which he duly did on 7th September. His favourable report was sent to the Church Building Commission on 10th September.

Thereafter it was simply a matter of equipping the chapel with a service book and any furnishings deemed essential. Having paid for the chapel's construction in its entirety, the Commissioners were adamant in providing no further aid to the new place of worship.

The churchwardens of St Laurence's did remarkably well, in the

circumstances, to have the chapel ready for the first public service on 9TH October. Next month's issue will describe that day's events.
